BATH, OHIO – Saturday, September 17, 2011, Hale Farm & Village in Bath, Ohio, presents the **3rd Annual Hale Run**. The 10k and 5k loop courses take runners along pastures, nature trails, and through the historic grounds of Hale Farm & Village. The Family Fun Walk follows the route Jonathan Hale took in 1810 from Glastonbury, Connecticut, noting significant historic “activity stations” along the way. Run local and discover the natural beauty and serenity of 90 privately owned acres located in the heart of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Proceeds from Hale Run benefit Hale Farm & Village education programs. Awards will be presented to the top three male and female finishers for the 10K and 5K races.
