A Short History of Hale Farm & Village

On July 13, 1810, Jonathan Hale, a farmer from Glastonbury, Connecticut, ended his journey to the wilderness of the Ohio Country. After traveling 646 miles in 28 days, he arrived at his new home in Range 12, Township 3 of Connecticut's Western Reserve, now known as Bath, Ohio. Jonathan began work on the Hale house in 1825, the same year ground was broken for the Ohio Canal, and by 1827, "Old Brick" was ready for occupancy. Three generations of Hales lived on the farm. Jonathan's great-grand daughter, Clara Belle Ritchie, acquired the property in the 1930s and supervised restoration work, but never lived in the house herself. Upon her death in 1956, Miss Ritchie bequeathed the property to the Western Reserve Historical Society. It was specified in her will that WRHS was "to establish the Hale Farm...as a museum... to the end that the greatest number of persons may be informed as to the history and culture of the Western Reserve." Since 1958, Hale Farm & Village has been preserving and interpreting life in the Western Reserve.
