Rabbi Kabakoff Named To Assist At Holy Services

Rabbi Jacob Kabakoff, dean of the Institute of Jewish Studies, Cleveland, will serve with Rabbi Samuel Meyer in officiating at the Hebrew and English services during the High Holidays, it has been announced.

Rabbi Kabakoff's last appearance in Lorain was in June, when he delivered the main address to Hebrew School graduates at commencement exercises.

Cantor Altman will chant the liturgy during the services in the Temple Proper and the Temple choir, under the directorship of Sheldon Satin, will sing for the English services.

Rabbi Kabakoff has devoted almost his entire career to the field of adult Jewish education. He is a graduate of Teachers Institute of Yeshiva University and of Yeshiva College.

He was ordained a rabbi in 1944 at the Jewish Theological Seminary and occupied a pulpit in Philadelphia from 1944 to 1948, after which he entered the educational field as director of Educational Facilities in Flatbush, N. Y.

Rabbi Kabakoff spent 1950 to 1952 in Israel where he held an editorial position on the Encyclopaedia Hebraica. While in Israel, the Rabbi edited a new Hebrew dictionary which was published in 1952.

Rabbi's Corner

With the rapid approach of the solemn find our thoughts turning to the ties which bind our generation to those that have gone. We think of the sweet, kind and inspiring influences which were our parents'. At the same time, how many realize the fact that we, too, are the influencing generation for those who will follow? How many know, realize or care about the work that is being done by our community to influence the younger generations? How many are aware of the training, which we are giving to our potential successors, beside the religious training supplied by our Congregation through our Hebrew and Sunday Schools?

I would like to bring to your attention the names of funds and foundations set up by our organizations, so that all may know and be inspired.

Sisterhood sponsors the Pitzele Memorial Fund, supported by individual donations and fund raising affairs, to provide camp scholarships for qualified Teen-Agers at Leadership Training camps.

Hadassah has organized a Zionist Youth Commission, which provides leadership training through camp scholarships, seminars and regional training sessions. The Moyer Memorial Fund supported by individual contributions provides scholarships to the Brandeis Camp, where training is given in community leadership and Jewish Culture. This program is noteworthy and should be appreciated in its proper light, for it supplements the work that our Temple is doing through Hebrew School, Sunday School and our Youth Program.

At the same time, we must understand our individual responsibilities in conjunction with the Community attempts to provide the proper training and atmosphere in our role of the preceding generation. Services are provided for the children of our community on all holidays. The Superintendent of Schools is informed well in advance, and permission is granted our children to absent themselves from Public School classes in a truly American way, which provides for freedom of worship. Yet there are some parents who insist on their children attending classes on our HOLY DAYS. No other religious group in this city would take part in such a craven act. I note with satisfaction that this group of parents is definitely in the minority, and that their number is rapidly decreasing.

The responsibility which we shoulder must be carried by ALL. Please, this year, cooperate. Bring your children to Temple. Don't allow your child to have the dubious honor of being the only Jewish child to attend classes on a Holy Day. Take your place among those who will be influences long remembered among our Jewish Community.

NATIONAL and INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

RABBI MAX NUSSBAUM MAY GO ON NATIONAL TV NEXT YEAR

Rabbi Max Nussbaum of Temple Israel may appear on a national TV network program this fall from Los Angeles.

Variety Magazine published a statement that a major network was in the midst of negotiations with Rabbi Nussbaum, who is an orator of note, for the program. How close such a program, if it were to be scheduled, would approximate the Father Sheen program, which has been so well received, is not known.

It is reported from a source close to Rabbi Nussbaum that the program would be a sort of "peace of mind" presentation, designed to take up personal relationships rather than political and international questions.

One network which has been looking for a rabbi to conduct this type of program is Dumont, whose programming and production director, James L. Caddigan, disclosed recently he had been visiting synagogues at weekend services for more than a year in search of a rabbi with Bishop Sheen's TV appeal.

B'NAI B'RITH SEEN EXPANDING 'INSTITUTES'

The appointment of Sidney G. Kusworm of Dayton, O., to head a special committee "to evaluate the program . . . and future activities" of the Wildacres Institutes, has led to speculation that the Order may be preparing to enlarge the institutes into a major project.

Philip M. Klutznick, president, made the appointment, and declared that the committee would hold a Wildacres Institute before reporting to the B'nai B'rith administrative committee.

NEW YORK UNIVERSITY GETS \$200,000 FOR HEBREW CHAIR

Contributions totalling \$200,000 have been received by New York University for the endowment in perpetuity of a Chair of Hebrew Culture and Education at the University.

According to Dr. Abraham I. Katsh, professor of education, who holds the Chair, the endowment will make possible 25 courses in three different curricula leading to undergraduate and graduate degrees.

The program is designed to prepare students to teach Hebrew in high schools and colleges, train teachers and supervisors for Jewish nursery, kindergarten and elementary schools, and provide a Jewish cultural background for professional workers in social service and related fields.

AS YE SOW SO YE REAP

Outstanding representatives of nearly every phase of American life gathered here last weekend for the three-day Aaronsburg, Pennsylvania, Assembly, described as a "new experiment in human relations."

The event is the outgrowth of the Aaronsburg Story, a pageant presented four years ago in this Centre County village of 213 permanent residents before a throng of 30,000.

The pageant commemorated the 150th anniversary of the founding of Aaronsburg's Salem Lutheran Church. The church was made possible through a gift of land and a pewter Communion set by Aaron Levy, a Jewish immigrant from Holland who founded this community in 1786.

Civic leaders from all sections of the country decided recently that Aaronsburg, scene of that long-ago example of brotherhood, would be an ideal place to hold what is hoped to be an annual assembly at which ideas could be exchanged and practical solutions to social problems explored.

On Sunday, the closing day, Levy's gift to the church was returned in part at a ceremony when New York Supreme Court Judge Edgar J. Nathan, descendant of another early Jewish immigrant family, received a pewter replica of a Kiddush cup.

The seminars were devoted to discussing "Living Above Our Prejudices" in government, business, the schools, the churches, the home and in recreation.

CHRISTIANS' PRAYER IRKS JORDAN

JERUSALEM — Relations between the Kingdom of Jordan and the Dutch Reformed Church of South Africa apparently did not get a boost from the visit to the former country of a group of Reformed ministers.

The Jerusalem Post cited a report from A-Diffa, Old City Arab daily, that a couple traveling with the clergymen remained behind after the rest of the group left the Wailing Wall, which is in the Jordan-occupied section of Jerusalem.

Jordan police noticed the couple writing on a slip of a paper, which they then pushed between the huge stones of the Wall.

The police removed the slip, which allegedly read:

"I pray to God to make Israel victorious and to occupy the Temple of Solomon and the Holy Places."

Jordan wanted to detain the pilgrims, but the British Consul intervened and the pilgrims were simply asked to stay in their hotel until the party was to leave Jordan the next day.

And the return trip of the group to Israel was an unusual one. Instead of merely walking down the street to enter Israel territory through the Mandelbaum Gate, Jordan forced them to fly back to Israel via Cyprus.

According to The Post, the Arab newspaper urged Jordan tourist companies dealing with pilgrim groups to check identities carefully before admitting them of Jordan, to prevent Jewish espionage.

The only Jewish military cemetery in the U. S. is in Virginia. It is a section of the Richmond Hebrew cemetery called "Soldier's Section." Only Confederate soldiers are buried there.

Joseph Pulitzer, publisher who established the famous award named for him, was the first person of Jewish descent in America whose picture appeared on a U. S. postage stamp.

NAMES FOR YIZKOR SERVICES

As is our custom, names of departed are memorialized in the course of our Yizkor services on Yom Kippur, Sukkos, Passover and Shevuos. Names that are recorded in the Book of Life, or on the Memorial Plaques in our Temple are automatically included in the services. Any one desiring to add the names of their dearly departed must submit them to Rabbi Meyer no later than September 14.

Names that were included in previous years that are not in the Book of Life or Memorial Plaque lists will not be included this year unless they are re-submitted by September 14. This action is necessary, in order that the memorial list not become unwieldy due to accumulations of the past years.
