

Prejudice in Cleveland

This is an advertisement from the *Cleveland Herald* on November 22, 1865. What does the last sentence say?

WANTED-FEMALE HELP.

WANTED—GIRL—Immediately, a good kitchen girl; must be able to wash and iron well. Apply at 104 St. Clair street. nov22-a*

WANTED—GIRL—A girl to do general housework, at 71 Bolivar street. None but one experienced need apply. nov22-d*

WANTED—GIRL—To do general housework. Good references required. 18 Hamilton street, between Wood and Bond. nov22d*

WANTED—GIRL—A Girl to do the general work of a family of three. Inquire at 82 Lake street. No Irish need apply. nov22-c

WANTED—GIRLS—Two or three good girls will find employment at the Old Water Cure by applying to the matron. nov22c*

WANTED—COOK—Good Cook; one who understands her business and is well recommended. Apply at 141 St. Clair st. nov22c-d*

Like in other cities in America, Irish immigrants faced discrimination in Cleveland. While these advertisements were rare, it was still sometimes difficult for Irish immigrants to find jobs. Despite this discrimination, many Irish women and girls were able to find work as household servants.
